

Past Masters Word

Reflections from the Past Master's Chair
Brethren,

Greetings Brethren,

Welcome back to our stated meetings! September marks the return from darkness for those lodges that observe it—and let me be clear: being “dark” doesn’t mean disappearing. It doesn’t mean we stop being Masons, or that we can’t gather. It just means we take a break from stated business. That’s it.

The Nevada Masonic Code doesn’t mandate a dark summer. Some lodges choose to go dark for stated meetings by their bylaws, but the brotherhood doesn’t stop. Fellowship, practice, education, and social events? Those still belong to us. So if you’ve spent the summer using “we’re dark” as your excuse to do nothing, you’ve missed the point entirely.

In the jurisdiction where I was initiated, passed, and raised, we didn’t go dark. In fact, almost every week we had something going on—practice, degrees, or even just informal gatherings. We had a saying: “Every Thursday is Lodge night.” And that rhythm stuck. After a while, the week didn’t feel right without lodge in it. That mindset? It shaped me. It reminded me that lodge is more than a meeting—it’s a lifestyle.

And that lifestyle becomes even more important when you step into the officer line. Being Master is not a once-a-month gig. It’s not just showing up to read an agenda. It’s being ready for the midnight phone call when a brother passes. It’s carrying the weight of the lodge between meetings. And if you decide to pursue Grand Lodge, the commitment only grows from there.

Masonry is not a job. It’s a way of life. And being an officer is a choice—a personal commitment to give more of yourself to that life, to help grow your lodge, and to lift your brethren. If you’re asking to move up, but complain about longer meetings, or don’t want to attend anything other than the stated, then you’re asking for the wrong reasons. Titles without effort do nothing for the Craft.

I recently had to miss a Master Mason degree for a very close friend—one I personally recommended to the lodge. That hurt. But a long-planned family event fell on the same night, and as much as I wanted to be there, I couldn't. I felt guilty about it until a brother—one I didn't even talk to at lodge, but at work—reminded me with just two words: cable tow. We each have one. And each one is a different length.

That moment grounded me again. It reminded me that balance matters. And it reminded me of something else, too—something we all forget now and then:

The ritual matters. Every time.

It doesn't matter if it's the first time you've seen it or the hundredth. Rushing through ritual just to say we finished faster than last month? That's not Masonry. It's not a race. We don't gather to check a box—we gather to mean something. To do the work with care, with respect, and yes—with joy. Fun and decorum are not opposites. A meaningful meeting can have both.

If we only meet once a month, we should treasure that time. We should want to hear the ritual done well. We should want to conduct business with dignity. And we should always be looking for more chances to come together—because that's what builds stronger Masons and a stronger lodge.

Welcome back, brothers. Let's make this season count.
